The Holy Family Regional School Advisory Council (formerly referred to as Board of Directors) is committed to:

Each election cycle, there are typically five seats that are required to be filled.

Living our Mission/Spiritual and Religious Formation

1. During the weeks of Lent:

- Mrs. Myers will offer student prayer opportunities during recess, one day a week, at both the north and south campuses.
- A virtual Rosary will be hosted by Mr. and Mrs. Myers every Wednesday.
- Reconciliations will be offered to students in grades 3-8.
- A parent-led Rosary for Peace will take place at north campus on Friday mornings, 8:30
 AM in St. Andrews. We will be joining the parishioners who gather each Friday to pray
 the rosary.
- The virtue of Fortitude will be highlighted during morning announcements and in religion classes.
- Passion play practices continue. There is much catechesis that happens with the student cast as they take on the roles of people in Jesus' last days.
- 2. The third graders are learning about the Pentecost. To enhance the lesson, students were instructed to fill a white piece of paper with the colors of red, orange, and yellow to represent the fire above the Apostles' heads. Students could create whatever pattern they desired but the goal was to let no white space show. The Holy Spirit fills each person just as completely and entirely as students filled their paper. A dove was added into the center to represent the Holy Spirit along with the gifts given to each person.

Living our Mission/Academic Excellence

- 1. Some Middle school students have scored 'post high school level' of reading excellence on the STAR reading test. These students are also able to help lead classroom discussions applying critical thinking skills, and proper literary terms to dissect literature.
- 2. Our 8th graders have been chosen to participate in math and reading testing from the National Assessment of Educational Progress from the National Department of Education. We will be excited to see how our students perform next to their peers.

Living our Mission/Service to Others

- 1. The middle school Science department has just completed a 3 year process of converting their classrooms into green classrooms. They have transferred all notes, assignments, tests, and quizzes into google formats. This has considerably improved the amount of paper used, helping both the environment and our school budget.
- 2. First graders are completing a weekly chore at home during the weeks of Lent that they aren't normally responsible for and can independently complete. Children will earn \$2 at the end of their commitment and will donate the money to cover the cost of a spring craft for the residents of Waltonwood.

Cardinal Virtue of Fortitude Educating You and your Child

Your child(ren) are learning about this virtue this month of March

Fortitude both a virtue ad Gift if the Holy Spirit! It means courage.

Related virtues are Industriousness, Magnanimity, Magnificence, Patience and Perseverance

Here are a few thoughts that have been shared with your children...

Fortitude is strength ... not strength from your muscles but strength in your mind and your conscience. It is often called courage. Do you know what it is to be courageous? There are different types of courage...meaning you aren't afraid of things. Fortitude, though, means you have a courage, but courage to make the right choices and to do the right thing. It is a shield from God to protect you from hurt feelings, and it helps you endure difficulties and pain ... for the sake of what is good.

We know we have the mark of fortitude, when we are confident in our faith, and heroic in the things expected of us... whether big or small. We know, with God, we can do anything...we are not lazy, we are not reckless, and we don't do things that would hurt ourselves, or others. We can say no to things we know is wrong...even when saying no to friends...or even saying no to a group of people who may make fun of us. That is true courage, true fortitude. Think for a moment whether you know someone who has the mark of fortitude? Do you?

Having fortitude also means *saying yes* when you normally might not...or maybe when you really don't want to do something. For instance, if you see someone who needs help, you would go help them...even if you are tired, or if you are being called away from something you are busy doing. You would say "yes" I will help because I know it is the right thing to do.

We have been talking about, not being afraid to do things that help others, and how our behaviors should lead to good. However, we must remember that when we are *doing good for God*, we should not seek praise. We should not muster up courage to do things just to get noticed, or to win praise. We, as God's people, should always be humble. If someone notices the good you have done (and you haven't told them) then, for sure, say thank you ... and then thank God for showing that *what you did* made a difference. Don't do good to please yourself.





Gospel Witnesses

During Black History Month, we raise up the memory of Black Americans whose lives inspire us to live our baptismal call to the fullest, and implore their intercession to blot out the sin of racism.

Pierre Toussaint was born into a Catholic slave family on June 27, 1766, on a French plantation in modern day Haiti. The Bérard family educated him as a house slave and took him with them when they moved to New York City in 1787. He was apprenticed as a hairdresser, and since the wealthy had hairdressers come to their homes and he was allowed to keep much of his earnings, his kind and cheerful disposition assured a steady and lucrative position in the society of the time. He took the surname of "Toussaint" in honor of the hero of the Haitian revolution. Due to his service to the family he was freed at age 45. He then married and purchased a house where together he and his wife fostered orphans, supporting them in getting an education and learning a trade. Bilingual in French and English, he was able to help many Haitian immigrants, organizing a credit bureau, an employment agency and a refuge for destitute travelers. He attended daily Mass and was a benefactor of many charitable organizations. He died on June 30, 1853, and was declared Venerable in 1996.

Mary Elizabeth Lange was born around 1789 in Santiago de Cuba, where she lived in a primarily French speaking community. She came to Baltimore, where a great number of Catholic, French-speaking refugees had settled. Although Elizabeth was a refugee, she was well-educated and wealthy due to money left to her by her father. In 1828, with the help of Sulpician Father James Joubert, she and two other Black women started a school for Black Catholic children. The following year she and three other Haitian women pronounced vows in what became known as the Oblate Sisters of Providence, the first religious order of women of African descent. At first their educational work met with success and the sisters won praise for nursing victims of a cholera epidemic, but internal difficulties led to a split. Mother Lange eventually resumed leadership in 1844 and despite discouragement, racism and a lack of funds, the sisters continued to educate children and minister to the needs of the Black Catholic community. She died on February 3, 1882.

Thea Bowman was born in Mississippi on December 29, 1937. Her grandfather had been born a slave but her father was a physician and her mother a teacher. Though they were Methodists, they enrolled in her in a Catholic school and at age nine she asked them if she could become Catholic. After high school she joined the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration at LaCrosse, Wisconsin, the only Black sister in the congregation. She went on to higher studies at the Catholic University in Washington, D.C., earning a Ph.D. in English. After teaching for sixteen years, she became directly involved in ministry to her fellow African-Americans. Gifted with a brilliant mind, a beautiful voice and a dynamic personality, Sister Thea shared the message of God's love through inspirational talks across the country and beyond. Her work had a huge impact upon Catholic liturgical music in providing an intellectual, spiritual, historical, and cultural foundation for developing and legitimizing a distinct worship form for Black Catholics. In 1984, Sr. Thea was diagnosed with breast cancer. She prayed "to live until I die." Her prayer was answered, and Thea continued her gatherings seated in a wheelchair. In 1989, the U.S. bishops invited her to be a key speaker at their conference on Black Catholics. She died at age 52 on March 30, 1990.

What is the Laudato Si' Action Platform?

The *Laudato Si'* Action Platform (Platform) is a new and groundbreaking faith-driven and ecological initiative to engage the Catholic Church in a seven-year journey to global sustainability and spiritual conversion. The Platform is a collaboration between the Vatican and a coalition of Catholic organizations across the world, many in the United States.

The Platform offers Catholics an interactive place to learn, act, and spiritually grow together in their homes and Catholic institutions in which they pray, discern and work. It is designed to inspire and equip the Catholic Church to implement Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'* with planning, guidance, resources and community so we may integrate creation care more fully into our daily lives and with our Catholic communities and institutions.

You are warmly invited to embark on this effort along with others in the U.S. Catholic community, as we join our brothers and sisters around the world. Your unique "culture, experience, involvements, and talents" are needed on this journey towards greater love for our Creator, each other, and the home we share (LS 14.) The initiative is rooted in the strengths and realities of communities around the world and is designed to empower everyone to take "decisive action, here and now" as we journey towards a better future together (LS 161.)

Why is the Platform Needed?

Our Church teaches us that care for creation is a precious gift from God intended to be shared by all – our one common home, and a requirement of our faith. (USCCB, Seven Themes of Catholic Social Teaching) God calls us to care for all His creation, but we are now in a climate crisis. Earth, our common home, is facing a grim future as pollution, higher temperatures, droughts, wildfires, stronger storms, floods, and biodiversity loss, are all creating and driving up the risk of enormous suffering, especially for our most vulnerable brothers and sisters everywhere. These challenges demand meaningful and urgent responses from all of us. We are at a Kairos moment. We must respond to the call for healing and renewal in our relationships with God, our neighbors, and the Earth itself. Through the Platform, we can walk this "path to renewal" together (LS 202.)

What are the Goals of the Platform?

To respond to this moment, the Laudato Si' Action Platform is organized around seven goals:

- 1. Response to the Cry of the Earth
- 2. Response to the Cry of the Poor
- 3. Ecological Economics
- 4. Adoption of Sustainable Lifestyles
- 5. Ecological Education
- 6. Ecological Spirituality
- 7. Community Engagement and Participatory Action



Who Can Participate?

Everyone! The Vatican offers the *Laudato Si'* Action Platform as a service to all peoples and institutions of the Catholic Church, and all men and women of good will. To help organize engagement, it is designed around seven sectors of the Catholic Church:



Families/individuals



Parishes & dioceses



Educational institutions



Hospitals & healthcare centers



Organizations & groups (NGOs, lay movements, ecological communities, foundations, communications centers)



Economic entities (farms, cooperatives, businesses)



Religious orders (orders, provinces, communities)


You can register to be a part of the journey when the next cohort registers later next year. This is a seven-year journey with ongoing opportunities to engage with the Platform.
